## Dealing with FALSE TEACHERS - Pt 1

1. Because of the apostasy it is clear that, as in generations past, there are false teachers in the church today

(Acts 20:29-30; 1 Tim 4:1-3; 2 Tim 4:1-4; 2 Cor 2:17)

- 2. God calls those who teach in the church
  - a) to teach with integrity, reverence and incorruptibility
  - b) to pay attention to how they teach and live
  - c) to retain the pattern of sound words in the Scripture
  - d) not to be carried away by varied and strange teachings
  - e) to handle the word of truth accurately
  - f) to hate and abhor all that is false

(Titus 2:7-8 NIV; 1 Tim 4:16; 2 Tim 1:13; Titus 2:1; Heb 13:9a; 2 Tim 2:15; Ps 119:104, 163, Prov 13:5a)

3. Those who preach and teach are to be held to the high standard prescribed in Scripture because they will face a stricter judgment, a greater condemnation than those they teach

(James 3:1)

4. False teachers are those who propagate views, perspectives and proclamations claimed to be truthful yet which contradict or distort what the Bible teaches

- 5. Particularly dangerous to the church are false teachings concerning the foundational and central tenets of the Christian faith:
  - a) the Bible as the source of revelation
    - → is there a denial of the Bible's
      - divine inspiration
      - reliable historicty and science
    - → a denial of the uniqueness of the Bible
    - → is the Bible seen as on one level with
      - church tradition or culture
      - visions, dreams or human imagination
      - human wisdom and reasoning
    - → is the Bible trivialized or treated with contempt however subtle
  - b) the nature and person of Jesus Christ
    - → is there a denial of
      - Jesus' full humanity AND full deity
      - Jesus' uniqueness and supremacy
      - the Trinity
  - c) how salvation is gained and maintained
    - → is there a denial of the need for salvation from sin and judgment
    - → is the gospel social or political
    - → is salvation by human merit, by works
    - → is there a denial of man's total inability
    - → is there a denial of sovereign grace
    - → is grace used as an excuse to sin

- 6. False teachers must be dealt with because their errors have a devastating impact on individuals as well as on the church as a whole:
  - a) they exalt human reasoning and diminish or avoid the infinite wisdom of God
  - b) they make Christ of no benefit
  - c) they cause the way of truth to be maligned
  - d) they promote controversies rather than God's work which is by faith
  - e) they cause divisions and put obstacles in the way of believers
  - f) they alienate people from those who teach the truth
  - g) they bewitch, disturb, and trouble believers and try to bring them into bondage again
  - h) they toss people back and forth with their deceitful scheming
  - i) they cause people to be shaken
  - j) their lies lead to the ruin of the hearers
